

**DRC** has been present in **Mali** since **2013** when the country started facing **various forms of violence**, particularly in the northern Sahelian strip, in Timbuktu region, where community tensions and conflicts between the Malian armed forces and non-State armed groups continue raising. DRC Mali places the principles of **mainstreaming protection** at the centre of its interventions, and also implements peacebuilding projects, specialised protection (generalist protection with a focus on **GBV** and **child protection**), and integrated protection (**food security** and **armed violence reduction**).



The humanitarian situation in Mali since 2012 continues to deteriorate. 11 years after the initial outbreak of the crisis, the January 2023 Humanitarian Needs Assessment shows **8.8 million people in** 

need of assistance (41% of the national population), including 6.8 million (30% of the population) in severe needs. With 4.2 million people affected in January 2023, protection is the second area of humanitarian need after health. Indeed, Mali is facing a major protection crisis. The population is exposed on a daily basis to serious and repeated violations of their fundamental rights, attacks on their physical and psychological integrity and disrespect for their dignity. A central element of this protection crisis is the severe displacement crisis, in a threatened protective environment characterised by the low availability and accessibility of basic social services, the withdrawal of state services from many areas, their weak capacity or the population's distrust of these services, as well as the negative coping strategies adopted by the communities. By January 2023, Mali had reached the number of 412,387 internally displaced persons.
